Strengthen Staff and Client Recruitment & Retention

- Retain skilled staff while actively recruiting new foster families to serve more children.
- Distribute annual staff satisfaction surveys to gauge morale, engagement, and fulfillment.
- Partner with the University of Michigan and Eastern Michigan University to bring on interns, helping to reduce staff workload.
- Organize monthly staff trainings that promote learning, connection, and team-building.

Promote Inclusivity Across the Agency

- Acknowledge the 2021 HRC report: 1 in 3 youth in foster care identifies as LGBTQ+, yet only 14% of LGBTQ+ adults can identify an inclusive foster agency.
- Build a more inclusive culture to increase family placements, adoptions, and client satisfaction.
- Conduct inclusive recruitment by leveraging community outreach, social media, and advocacy partnerships.
- Evaluate our inclusivity annually through internal surveys of staff perceptions of our programs and policies.

Expand Community Outreach

- Develop new partnerships with local businesses and community organizations to support our mission.
- Host events using existing community resources to increase visibility and engagement.
- Share stories, photos, and videos on social media to raise awareness, destigmatize foster care, and encourage advocacy.
- Contact local business leaders via phone, email, and social media to share our annual report, partnership proposals, and informational presentations.

Unite Programs on One Campus

- Launch a capital campaign to fund a consolidated campus that houses ILP, Girlstown, and Guiding Harbor staff and services.
- Expand our donor base through strategic social media engagement and partnerships with local university social work programs.



REUNIFICATION STORY:

DAVID & EMILIA

The story of David and Emilia illustrates how stability, structured support, and community involvement can profoundly impact lives within the child welfare system. Their journey began when they were placed with their great aunt, giving them a stable environment during a difficult time.

David and Emilia, just 9 and 8 years old, entered the foster care system in January 2022. They were in the same grade, and deeply bonded. Their removal from home was necessary due to multiple concerns: ongoing exposure to domestic violence, allegations of neglect, the presence of drugs in the household, and growing worries about their mother's mental health. They were placed with their great aunt—thankfully, their only placement during the case. This stability gave them a much-needed sense of continuity, even as they coped with trauma and uncertainty.

Their family faced serious challenges. Their mother struggled with depression, anxiety, and low self-esteem, while their father had violent outbursts and couldn't manage his emotions. Together, these issues created an unstable home, requiring a well-planned approach to help both the parents and children.

With help from their dedicated case worker Brandi and the support of Guiding Harbor, a plan was set up to guide the parents toward reunification. This included therapy, parenting classes, domestic violence education, and support for visitation. The children also received specialized care. David got help through an educational advocate, behavioral intervention, and an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) to assist with learning difficulties. Brandi worked tirelessly alongside the family, helping the mother rediscover her strength and voice

With help from their dedicated case worker, Brandi and the support of Guiding Harbor, a plan was set up to guide the parents toward reunification.

Over time, their parents made steady progress. Visits began as supervised, then moved to unsupervised, and eventually overnight stays. A turning point came when their great aunt gave a 30-day notice, inspiring their mother to fully commit to bringing her children home. With Brandi's help and support from Guiding Harbor, their mom became actively involved in her children's lives. She made sure they attended school, managed their medical needs, secured David's medication, and participated in his IEP process. Most importantly, she rebuilt a loving and safe relationship with her children.

In July 2024, after more than two years of hard work and growth, the family was reunited. David and Emilia returned to a stable home with a mother determined to give them a bright future they deserve.





EXPANDING OUR CONTINUUM OF CARE: INTRODUCING INDEPENDENT LIVING PLUS (ILP)

We are thrilled to announce the expansion of our services to better meet the needs of youth in foster care through our new Independent Living Plus (ILP) program. Guiding Harbor opened our ILP program in May 2024 and we couldn't be more excited.

For many teens, transitioning to adulthood is a challenge. They need critical skills such as financial literacy, problem-solving, self-advocacy, and emotional resilience to manage life independently. However, teens in foster care often face additional hurdles, including frequent moves, disruptions in education, and the absence of stable, supportive adults, leaving them less prepared for adulthood.

The ILP program is designed to bridge this gap, helping foster youth aged 16 and older develop essential life skills in a safe and supportive environment. Open to youth of all gender identities, the program requires participants to either work and/or attend school as part of their eligibility.

Research shows that ILP programs reduce rates of incarceration and early pregnancy among foster youth while improving educational achievement, employment outcomes, and earlier identification of mental health needs.

Guiding Harbor's ILP program operates in a home-like setting tailored to meet each youth's unique goals for independent living. The program is a transitional, temporary intervention that helps youth prepare for traditional independent living placements. While the length of



stay is determined by individual assessments, services conclude by the youth's 20th birthday.

The ILP home offers a fully furnished space where each youth has their own private bedroom with a locking door, fostering both independence and security.

The ILP program focuses on empowering youth to achieve the following goals:

- Consistent employment or school enrollment
- Completion of an individualized treatment plan
- Building a financial foundation through savings
- Enhanced decision-making

and problem-solving skills.

- Demonstration of core life skills competencies

A successful transition from ILP may look different for each participant, but it typically involves moving to a traditional independent living program, equipped with the skills and confidence to thrive.

We are excited to expand our continuum of care to empower foster youth with the skills they need to navigate adulthood successfully. This program reflects our commitment to supporting young people as they build brighter, more independent futures.

Zayne's Story: Turning Passion Into Progress

At 19 years old, Zayne is preparing for a future he's building day by day through Guiding Harbor's Independent Living Plus (ILP) program. His journey has had challenges, but over the past year, Zayne has shown remarkable growth—driven by determination, responsibility, and a deep love for music.

Zayne's experience with the child welfare system began more than a decade ago. In 2023, after a serious incident at home, he was removed and placed into the ILP program. When Guiding Harbor assumed responsibility for the program in 2024, Zayne was among the youth we welcomed into our care.

Since then, Zayne has made tremendous strides. He is actively working toward his GED, has

passed the written portion of his driver's test, and—perhaps most exciting for him—he recently recorded in a professional studio for the first time. What started as creating songs on his phone in his bedroom has grown into real opportunities to pursue his passion. “That day in the studio,” he says, “was the best day of my life.”

But Zayne's motivation isn't just for himself—it's also for his younger brother. His desire to be a role model pushes him to build a stable, independent life. As he nears his 20th birthday and prepares to transition out of ILP, Zayne is focused on securing a job, building his credit, saving for an apartment, and eventually returning to his hometown with a renewed sense of purpose.

Throughout his time in the ILP program, Zayne has gained essential life skills—budgeting, time management, employment readiness, and housing planning—that will serve him well into adulthood. The ILP program, designed for youth ages 16 to 19 aging out of foster care, provides individualized support, skill-building, and stability during a critical time in their lives.

With the support of the Guiding Harbor team, Zayne is poised to leave the program with the tools he needs to succeed. We are proud of all he has accomplished and will continue to cheer him on as he pursues his goals and dreams.

GIRLSTOWN

UNDERSTANDING THE IMPACT OF GIRLSTOWN

Girlstown Residential has been a cornerstone of Guiding Harbor's mission since its establishment in 1958. Initially conceived as a temporary haven for troubled girls seeking a structured environment, the program has evolved significantly over the decades to address the changing needs of the community.

As foster care services became increasingly necessary, Girlstown adapted by focusing exclusively on girls in the foster care system who require more intensive support than traditional foster homes

can provide. Today, the program serves a unique population—girls navigating the foster care system while coping with childhood and current traumas, school truancy, and, in many cases, interactions with law enforcement. These individuals face instability, a lack of familial support, and limited control over their circumstances, underscoring the critical need for the 24/7 structure and care that Girlstown provides.

Despite the many years since this shift in focus, there remains some misunderstanding about

the nature of Girlstown's services. Families and caregivers often inquire about enrolling their children for additional structured support, not realizing that the program specifically serves foster care youth. While we empathize with the challenges faced by these families, Girlstown is dedicated to addressing the complex needs of foster care children, recognizing this as a vital and ongoing mission.

A Name, A Family, A Future

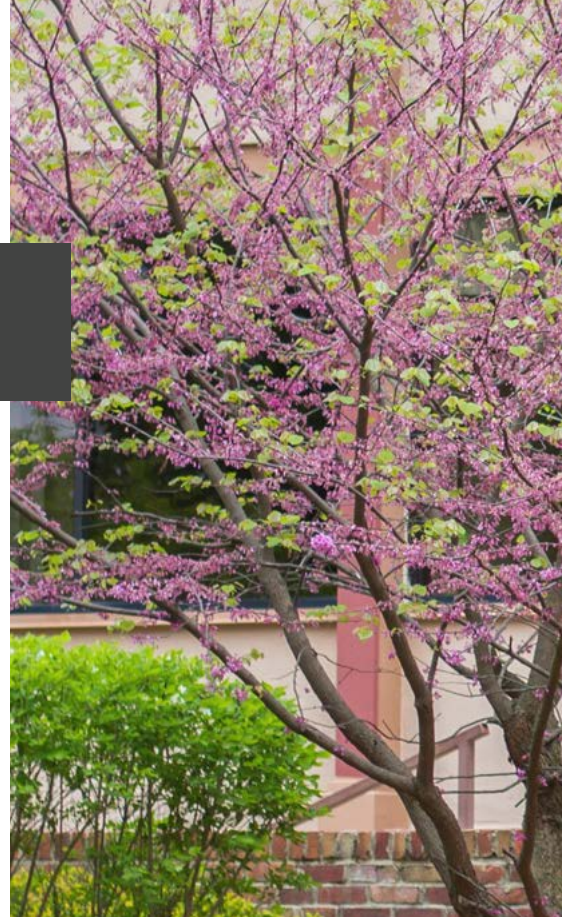
Victoria entered foster care at the age of 15, accompanied by her two younger siblings following the passing of their mother. Early in the case, their father's parental rights were terminated. Initially, all three siblings were placed together in the same foster home. However, due to ongoing conflict within the sibling group, largely stemming from Victoria having taken on a parental role with her younger

siblings, the team ultimately decided to place Victoria in a separate home to better support her individual needs.

Over time, Victoria transitioned through three different placements. Eventually, she found stability with Kat and Randy, licensed foster parents who were also family friends of her third foster home. Having met Victoria

several times previously, Kat and Randy were already familiar with her, which helped ease the transition into their home.

Although Victoria loves her siblings, their relationship was complicated. Acting as their primary caregiver at a young age created strain and tension, making the separation emotionally complex. Once settled into her new placement,





Victoria didn't feel a strong need to reconnect immediately with her siblings. Instead, she focused on her own healing and growth.

ADOPTION: FIVE ADOPTIONS. FIVE NEW BEGINNINGS. IN 2024, GUIDING HARBOR HELPED TURN UNCERTAINTY INTO UNCONDITIONAL LOVE — AND HOUSES INTO HOMES.

One of the few constants throughout her time in care was her passion for cheerleading. Despite her multiple moves, Victoria remained active on the cheer team, which provided her with emotional stability and meaningful relationships with her teammates.

As she approached her 18th birthday and high school graduation, time was of the essence to finalize her adoption and secure her permanency. The Guiding Harbor team worked tirelessly to ensure that Victoria's adoption with Kat and Randy was completed on time. Their efforts paid off, with a month to spare; her adoption was officially finalized, giving her the forever family she deserved.

Victoria's case worker, Blake, reflected on the significance of this milestone, as it was her first foster care case to result in adoption. She shared her surprise and appreciation that youth in foster care are given the opportunity to change not only their last names, but also their first names, as part of their adoption journey. Blake emphasized how this option allows foster children like Victoria to embrace a fresh start and a new identity with their adoptive families.

Victoria graduated from high school and was accepted into a university, where she is now pursuing her degree. She continues to be involved in club cheer and was awarded the Guiding Harbor Suzanne Baber Scholarship, which

supports foster youth who have received services from Guiding Harbor. This scholarship provides assistance for those pursuing higher education, trade school, or professional training, helping them build brighter futures.

Victoria's story is a powerful example of Guiding Harbor's mission in action. With resilience, support, and stability, she transitioned from uncertainty to a forever family just before adulthood. Her adoption, academic success, and scholarship award show what's possible when foster youth are given the tools and care they need to thrive. Stories like Victoria's remind us why our work is so vital.



Community Engagement: Girlstown Youth Volunteer with Belleville Rotary Club

This year, several youth from Girlstown had the opportunity to give back to the community by volunteering with the Belleville Rotary Club. In preparation for the Duck Race, part of the Taste of Belleville event, the youth helped “get their ducks in a row”, organizing race materials and supporting event setup.

The experience not only promoted community service and teamwork but also strengthened our youth’s connection to the local community. Events like this offer meaningful ways for our residents to engage in civic life and develop a sense of contribution and pride.

The Duck Race took place during Taste of Belleville and youth were proud to play a role in its success.

Trunk or Treat

Foster kids are just kids. They love candy, games, belly laughing, and jumping in the leaves. They enjoy playing make-believe and dressing up for Halloween in their favorite character costumes.

On a perfect fall evening when it was slightly warm with a cool breeze, the Annual Trunk or Treat Spooktacular delighted the families we serve. The kids enjoyed pizza, snacks, crafts, Uno, Spooky Bingo, and music. Outside, they played tag and soccer. The evening ended with the kids making their rounds, visiting the Halloween-themed trunks and other stations for trick-or-treating and free books.

This evening of kids just being kids would not have been possible without the generosity of River of Life Church, the loyal volunteers from Ally Financial, Trinity Episcopal Church for donating space, DJ Willy Williams spinning the tunes...Freeze Dance of course...and two Detroit City Football Clubs (DCFC) West teams volunteered and even got festive in costumes and joined in the fun.

The way the community came together to help the kids of Guiding Harbor have a typical kid experience, without judgement or stigma is exactly why we are so proud to be a part of this Belleville Area Community. Youth in foster care have experienced trauma and loss. For one night, they were given the opportunity to feel safe, secure, and joy thanks to the Guiding Harbor Trunk-or-Treat volunteers who gave them just that.





Community Support from the Charles B. Cozadd Rotary Foundation of Belleville

Thanks to the generous support of the Charles B. Cozadd Rotary Foundation, Guiding Harbor's Girlstown Residential Program was awarded a grant to purchase three endurance bedframes specially designed for behavioral and mental health facilities.

These endurance beds are constructed from a single molded piece of high-density, tamper-proof polyethylene plastic. They are exceptionally durable, free from exposed hardware, and easy to clean, making them ideal for ensuring safety in therapeutic environments where self-harm may be a concern. While traditional metal bedframes serve most residents well, certain behavioral

crises have required us to remove these frames, leaving residents to sleep with only a mattress on the floor. Though done solely for safety and never as punishment, this approach compromises comfort and dignity.

With the introduction of these new beds, our team can now provide a safe, secure, and dignified sleeping arrangement, even during times of behavioral health crises. These beds are marketed as virtually indestructible and are commonly

used in other residential and clinical settings. The variety of color options also allows us to maintain a warm, welcoming environment that supports therapeutic care.

This investment, made possible through targeted grant funding, directly enhances both the physical safety and emotional wellbeing of the youth we serve, reinforcing our ongoing commitment to trauma-informed care and continuous improvement of our residential services.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

AND OFFICERS

During 2024, the Board of Directors played a pivotal role at Guiding Harbor, steering our strategic vision, overseeing governance, and guiding crucial decision-making processes. Comprising 20 individuals with diverse backgrounds and expertise, our Board's collective dedication is instrumental in ensuring the long-term success and sustainability of our organization.

Our Board members bring a wealth of experience and knowledge to the table, representing diverse fields including public education, finance, human resources,

and personal insights from the foster care system. This breadth of perspectives enriches our decision-making and empowers us to effectively address the challenges our clients encounter.

Board members are elected by their peers at the Annual Meeting from a diverse slate of candidates, serving two-year terms with the possibility of reelection. They convene five times annually to deliberate and vote on organizational matters, ensuring the best interests of Guiding Harbor are served throughout the year.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF GUIDING HARBOR'S BOARD OF DIRECTORS

1. **Governance and Oversight:** The Board is responsible for setting the Guiding Harbor's mission, vision, and strategic direction. They ensure that we operate in accordance with our mission and values, and they oversee management to ensure effective implementation of the strategic plan.
2. **Fiduciary Responsibility:** The Board has a duty to ensure that Guiding Harbor is financially sound and that resources are managed responsibly. They approve budgets, financial statements, and major expenditures, and they monitor financial performance to protect our assets and investments.
3. **Executive Oversight and Accountability:** The Board hires, evaluates, and if necessary,

replaces the executive leadership. They provide guidance and support to the leadership team, ensure that the organization complies with legal and ethical standards, and maintain accountability to stakeholders, including donors, members, and the community.

These duties collectively ensure that the Board acts in the best interests of the organization and its stakeholders, maintaining transparency, accountability, and strategic foresight.

SPOTLIGHT - ERIKA,

HR SPECIALIST



Guiding Harbor is pleased to welcome our new Human Resources Specialist, Erika. Like many nonprofit organizations, Guiding Harbor depends on dedicated individuals wearing multiple “hats” to keep operations running smoothly despite limited capacity. In 2022, after conducting a thorough needs assessment, we identified a critical gap: the need for a dedicated Human Resource Specialist.

Previously, most HR responsibilities fell to our CEO, Jennifer—a less-than-ideal situation given her already demanding workload. Additionally, tasks like

interviews and personnel issues often fell on program managers and supervisors, adding significant time burdens to their already busy schedules. Recognizing the strain this placed on our team, we had many discussions, reworking our budget, and leveraged the generous support of our Giving from the Heart donors to address the issue.

In 2022, we were thrilled to welcome Erika as our new Human Resource Specialist. Erika has been transformative in streamlining Guiding Harbor’s HR processes, including recruitment, hiring, onboarding, policy updates, and compliance with employment laws. Her contributions have gone far beyond administrative duties; she has been instrumental in fostering a positive work environment, supporting staff, and significantly improving staff retention.

In recognition of her outstanding contributions, Erika was honored with the Wings of Excellence Award, presented to staff members who consistently go above and beyond in their roles..

Initiatives include a Driver's Education Program to give young people the mobility and independence they need for school and work, the addition of a Therapy Dog Program to provide comfort, emotional support, and healing, and the creation of a One Campus Model where all of our services can be offered in a centralized, supportive environment.

These future initiatives reflect our promise to remain a guiding harbor for every child, calming rough waters, charting steady paths toward independence, and building a strong community of care that embraces every young person who finds their way to our care.

Our future is bold, and it is built on the foundation of our history. With the continued generosity of our supporters and the dedication of our team, we are charting a course toward greater impact. Together, we will ensure that Guiding Harbor remains a guiding light yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

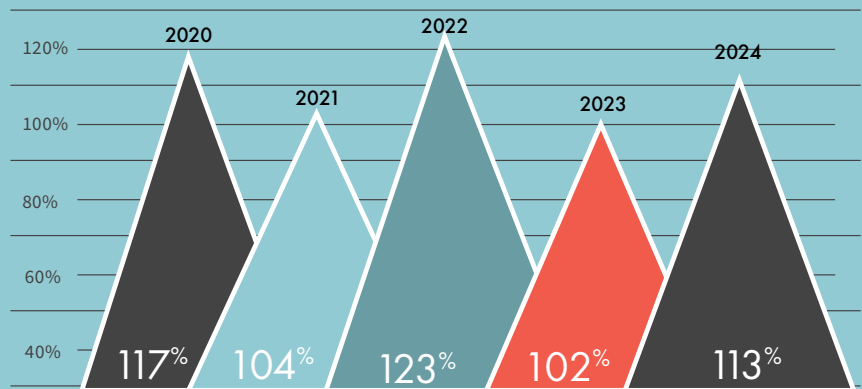

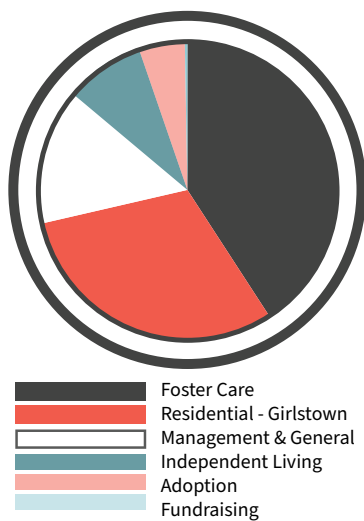
Auditor's Opinion

Total Expenses/Revenue



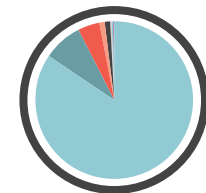
2024 Expenses



Allocated Costs

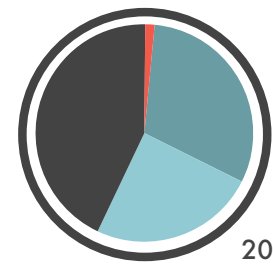

2024 Support & Revenue

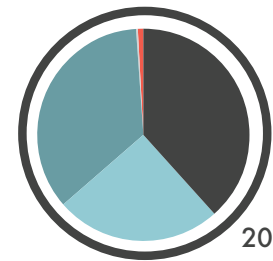

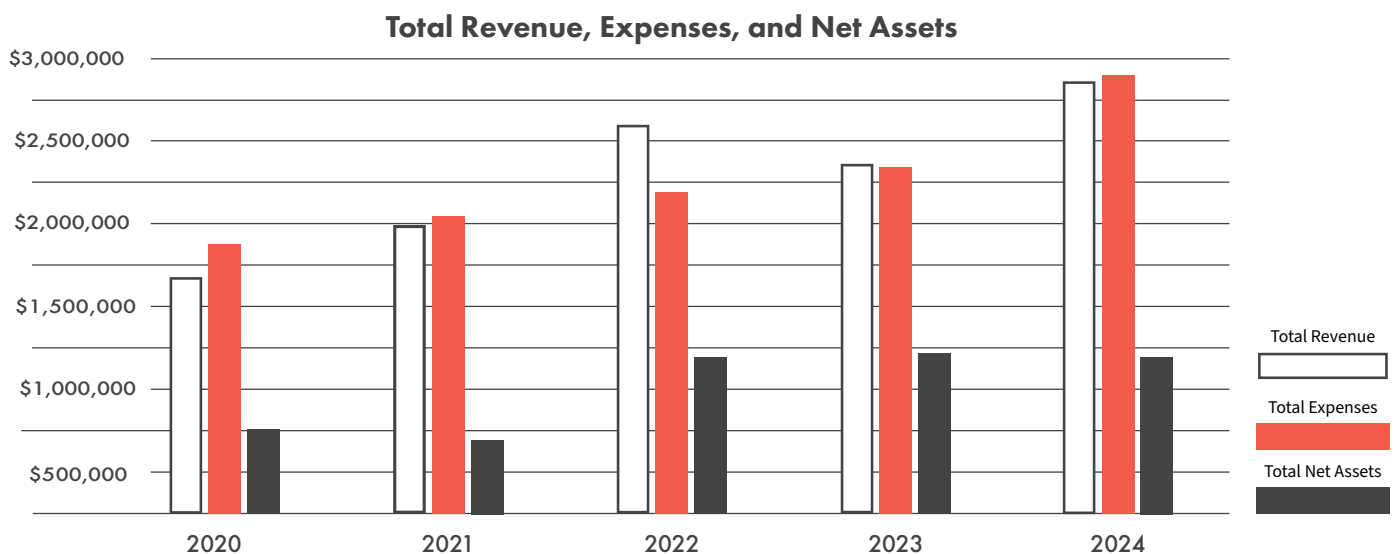

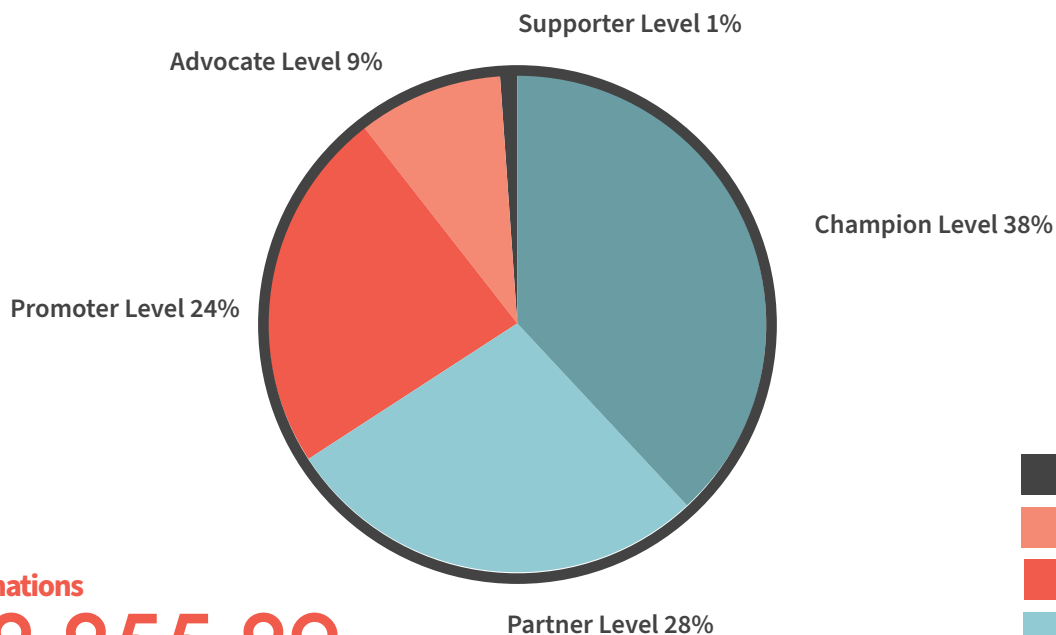
